Empowering students with disabilities to enter the hospitality industry



In an inspiring initiative to promote inclusivity and empower the deaf community, REACH has recently introduced cooking and bartending classes tailored specifically for deaf students. These classes, typically span one to three months, aim to provide essential skills and opportunities for individuals with hearing impairments to thrive in the culinary and hospitality industry.

Partnering with KymViet, a company with 100% of employees who are deaf, REACH has created a conducive environment for learning and skill development. The collaboration with KymViet offers a professional setting for the classes and opens doors for real-world experience and networking within the industry.

The bartending class accommodates five enthusiastic students and provides comprehensive training in mixology, beverage preparation, and customer service.

Led by experienced instructors who are fluent in

sign language, the course ensures that each student receives personalized attention and guidance throughout their learning journey. From mastering classic cocktails to honing their communication skills behind the bar, participants are equipped with the expertise and confidence to excel in the dynamic field of bartending.

Similarly, the cooking class, enrolling five dedicated students, focuses on fundamental culinary techniques, recipe development, and kitchen management. Through hands-on training sessions and interactive demonstrations, aspiring chefs are introduced to the artistry and precision required in professional cooking. From knife skills to flavour pairing, the curriculum fosters creativity and proficiency in the culinary arts, empowering students to pursue rewarding careers in the culinary industry.




One of the remarkable aspects of these classes is the emphasis on inclusivity and accessibility. Recognizing the unique needs of deaf students, REACH ensures that all instructional materials are adapted to accommodate different learning styles and communication preferences.

Moreover, it is noteworthy that three students from the cooking class have secured employment opportunities with Pepperonis Pizza, a prominent brand under Al Fresco, a well-known culinary brand in Vietnam. This achievement underscores the effectiveness of REACH's training programs in preparing students for successful integration into the workforce fields.

Adapting green skills today, building sustainability tomorrow

Green skills is one of the most important content of REACH's programs. With green skills, REACH expects to have students contribute to environmental protection. In particular, REACH mainstream green skills in each area that helps students apply them in their daily work. Some regulations will be used strictly to ensure all content is understandable and applicable to students from different backgrounds.

In 2023, REACH had a big step in implementing green skills in the daily life. One of the biggest effort was installing the solar panel system to provide solar electricity for the Hairdressing class. The students used this source of electricity to wash hair for people. According to the statistic software, REACH saved about 300 KWh of electricity. This number was equal to 9,01 kg of CO2, 33,37 liters of coal. Thanks to this, they contributed to a greener life considerably.



According to some students, they found that green skills were not difficult to implement but their benefits were huge. Specifically, F&B students had to learn how to save ingredients, choose organic ingredients, clean equipment and maintain a high standard of hygiene in the working area. It was novel knowledge with many bartenders because most of them believed that the main task of bartenders was making beverages. However, bartenders were not only assigned to create beverages but also responsible for keeping a healthy environment for their customers. Therefore, they had to learn how to comply with hygiene standards and have appropriate attitudes towards customers and managers.

Regarding 2D or 3D students, their green skills are associated with computers and machines. Specifically, IT students had to control the amount of electricity consumed. They had to save water, and electricity as much as possible to contribute to saving costs for their companies. It was an advantage that REACH students can offer businesses and the environment in general.

A year full of inspriation and cultural learning

In September last year, the United States Embassy of Vietnam orchestrated a series of impactful events featuring Christine Ha, aimed at inspiring local communities and promoting Vietnam's culinary heritage on a global stage. Among the esteemed stops on Master Chef Christine Ha's itinerary in Vietnam was REACH.

Many students at REACH eagerly anticipated Christine Ha's cooking demonstration. During the event, some of the students at REACH, particularly those facing disadvantages, were intrigued by Christine Ha's journey



as a visually impaired chef. They raised questions about the challenges she encountered and how she overcame them, finding inspiration in her story. Among the attendees were deaf students who were especially moved by Ha's demonstration, quickly idolizing her as a symbol of resilience and possibility.



Regarding the extracurricular activities, students had a chance to visit the Vietnam Museum of Ethnology. This activity encouraged students to study minor ethnicities because many of them were ethnic people. This trip was expected to be an occasion to strengthen the solidarity among REACH students and help ethnic students integrate into the new environment better.

Apart from visiting the museum, students also joined team-building games which allowed students from different classes to make friends with each other.

In September - October 2023, REACH's students had a chance to join the Green Wind Choir. They had a performance at The Circle of Green Choral Concert 2023" in Hanoi with meaningful songs. These songs encouraged the life justice and peace for all disadvantaged people.

As disadvantaged youth pursuing vocational training programs at REACH, students were proud to join a social event. They had an opportunity to befriend people from similar backgrounds, which consolidated their confidence to face hardship.



Nguyen Minh Chau: I never stop trying for my dream and believe "What will be, will be"



REACH believes that its students are special in many ways. They are strong enough to overcome hardships, confident enough to conquer challenges, and optimistic enough to believe in new opportunities. Nguyen Minh Chau is special like that. Enrolled in the 2D class, Batch 7 of the REACH centre in Ho Chi Minh City, he has fostered a dream to pursue a higher education institution. However, at the time, Chau could not orient himself on what to do next because

he had to find a stable job to support his family. As a result, he focused on studying and set his passion aside. It was a wise choice because Chau proved that he was one of the best students of this batch and he was more confident to conquer higher goals, including studying university.

Accidentally, Chau learned that REACH partnered with RMIT University to offer full scholarships for disadvantaged youth. It was a turning point for Chau because he was determined to apply for the scholarship which was considered the key to opening a new door for him. Therefore, Chau put a lot of effort into preparing documents. Also, he paid for an IELTS course to improve his English speaking. According to Chau, it was, at that time, a huge investment because he just started his career. But he paid off, this investment helped him to pass the interview round successfully.

Becoming the winner after many intense rounds, Nguyen Minh Chau appreciated this chance very much. He understood that he had to pay for it with more effort than his classmates so he promised himself that he could



continue working hard to prove that he deserved this great opportunity. In particular, he still accompanies REACH in many activities of the alumni community and supports other disadvantaged people to realise their dreams like him.

REACH has many students who became owners of the RMIT Scholarship in the past few years and each of them was a great example for REACH's students and disadvantaged youth in general to follow. It was also one of the goals motivating REACH to cooperate with RMIT University to launch this scholarship.

Overcoming Silence: Ta Thi Chinh's Journey from Adversity to Culinary Success

Ta Thi Chinh, born on November 29, 2003, hails from the rural area of Dong Xuan, Soc Son, in the vibrant city of Hanoi. Her story is one of resilience and determination, as she overcomes personal and familial challenges to carve out a brighter future for herself and her loved ones.

Growing up in a family with modest means, Chinh's mother works tirelessly as a labourer, earning a monthly income of around 5-6 million VND. Her father supplements the family's income through farming and occasional construction work. Life is not easy for the family of seven, which includes Chinh, her two younger siblings, and her elderly grandparents, who are no longer able to work. Chinh, born deaf and mute, faces additional challenges, but her spirit remains unbroken.



Despite the difficulties, Chinh's determination to learn and grow never wavered. She discovered REACH, an organization dedicated to empowering young people through vocational training, through a friend who also faced similar challenges. This discovery marked the beginning of a transformative journey for Chinh.

Enrolling in a Cooking class at REACH, Chinh found herself in an environment that was both nurturing and encouraging. "I am very happy and excited because I can make my favorite dishes," she shares. The teachers, known for their friendliness, enthusiasm, and dedication, made the learning experience enjoyable. Her classmates, equally supportive, created a harmonious and joyful atmosphere. Thanks to this, Chinh had a great time at REACH with colourful experiences and good friends.

Chinh's hard work and passion paid off when she secured a position as a Pizza kitchen assistant at Alfresco Group. This opportunity not only provided her with valuable professional experience but also brought her closer to her dream of financial stability. With a stable job, Chinh hopes to support herself and alleviate some of the economic pressures on her family.

Ta Thi Chinh's story is a testament to the power of perseverance and the impact of supportive educational environments. Her journey from a challenging upbringing to finding joy and purpose in her work serves as an inspiration to many. As Chinh continues to grow in her career, she remains committed to helping her family and paving the way for a brighter future.



With this belief, Quyet gradually conquered the path to becoming a professional photo editor. The IT industry is fiercely competitive, demanding expertise, technique, patience, and perseverance. With his strong determination, Quyet completed his course and successfully entered the IT industry as a photo editor at Pixel company.





The US Ambassador visited Quyet's class in 2021 After many years of working, Quyet made a decision full of humanity, which was to return to REACH but in a new role - as a teacher. Unlike in the past, Quyết came to REACH to learn, but now he has become a teacher, directly igniting the flame for generations of disadvantaged students, providing them with additional motivation to pursue their dreams and build their lives as they desire.

At the beginning of 2024, Quyet guested the "Love Station" program on the VTV1 channel, Vietnam National Television. He had an opportunity to talk about his journey, family and memories while working as a teacher at REACH. With Quyet, everything is valuable and consolidates his expectation to support more disadvantaged students so they can be sunflowers who always face the sun, successful in the IT industry as well and rely on themselves to build their lives.

We TARGET YOUNG PEOPLE WHO suffer from poverty or discrimination, such as human trafficked survivors, victims of domestic violence, those living with HIV/AIDS or disabilities, street children, migrant youth, school dropouts, and ethnic minorities.

Over 15 YEARS, we have educated over 21,000 young people between the ages of 16 and 30. Of those, we have placed more than 80% in decent employment. As such, REACH has contributed to achieving Vietnam's SDGs and national development strategies for youth development.
